# Fort Nashborough

Nashville's roots can be traced back to 1779 when the first permanent American settlements were established along the bluffs above the Cumberland River. Fort Nashborough, known originally as the Bluff Station, served to protect pioneers from armed incursions by Native Americans hostile to the expansion of white settlers into the area. The largest engagement took place in April, 1781, when a force of Chickamaugan Cherokee, led by Dragging Canoe, unsuccessfully attacked the station in what was known as the "Battle of the Bluffs."

Take tours of the houses that witnessed the bloodiest battle of the civil war. Carter House and

Carnton are open daily for guided house tours. Tours are offered throughout the day, and the last one begins at 4:00 pm. The Classic Tour at each site lasts approximately one hour, and we recommend spending an additional 30 to 60 minutes exploring the grounds and outbuildings. Use the map provided with the purchase of admission to explore the grounds and gardens of the historic houses before and after your tour. Original outbuildings are open at both locations. While we hope you have time to visit both historic houses, you may choose to visit just one. Carter House and Carnton are approximately 1.25 miles from each other. Both sites are convenient to downtown Franklin.



### Belle Meade Plantation \$24/person

Your visit to Belle Meade Plantation will include a tour led by a trained and costumed guide through the plantation's beautiful Greek-Revival mansion commissioned by John Harding in 1845. Your ticket also includes access to Belle Meade's many other historic buildings on the plantation grounds including a dairy, horse stable, carriage house, mausoleum, gardens, and a log cabin. After you've completed your tour of the house and grounds, a free wine tasting at our winery awaits. Don't forget to visit our gift-shop for unique gifts and Harding House, our on-site restaurant. Founded in 1807 by John Harding, "Belle Meade" translates to mean beautiful meadow in old English and French. The property began with just a single log cabin and 250 acres. The estate quickly grew to become a 5,400 acre thoroughbred horse farm complete with a Greek Revival Mansion, deer park, train station and rock quarry which supported five generations of owners, their servants and enslaved workers.
